The YMCA Wise Project works with and supports children and young people up to the age of 25 who are at risk of or experiencing sexual exploitation. The service works across Brighton and Hove, Surrey and East Sussex to support children and young people to stay safe in their relationships.



Bikeability – is the national programme for cycle training in England, Wales, and Scotland. The programme is purely voluntary-schools may sign up to host classes for children. Adults may also join classes. In England and Wales, the programme is administered by Cycling England.



The Education Support, Behaviour and Attendance Service (ESBAS) provide specialist support and guidance to schools to support children and young people with poor attendance, challenging behaviour, and issues related to bullying.



The Go Learn programme is delivered by Southeast Communities Rail Partnership and Southern, aims to help Y6 children develop confidence and skills for safe, independent travel on public transport to secondary school.

Learning intentions

The Speak out Stay safe sessions are tailored for each audience with content for each session, different and age appropriate.

SOSS for KS1 session is a very gentle introduction to the programme and is focussed on helping children speak to the range of grown-ups in and out of school, including Childline, about their worries or something that is making them feel unhappy.

SOSS for KS2 is aimed at helping children understand the different types of abuse so that they can get help for them or a friend if they need it. We will introduce, in a very child focused way, abuse in all its forms, including neglect, physical abuse, sexual abuse, emotional abuse, domestic abuse and bullying/online .The hear about Childline, and how the service can support them.

The workshops for Years 5-6 explore the definitions of neglect and sexual abuse in further detail and the children take part in engaging discussions, including looking at 4 different scenarios and deciding whether they are OK or not OK based on how a child would feel and importantly, who and where to go for help and support

This is a whole school approach to help promote children's resilience and prevent violence and abuse. It aims to support pupils from Reception to Year 6 to learn the skills to keep themselves feeling safe, and to ensure they can get help if they need it. This evidence-based programme is based on Protective Behaviours, the two core themes are:

"We all have the right to feel safe all the time"

"We can talk with someone about anything, even if it feels awful or small"

This resource will help schools to demonstrate how they meet Ofsted requirements around Keeping Children Safe. It provides a framework and tools for increasing children's resilience, and reducing their vulnerability, by supporting children's mental health and well-being.

The Cyber Choices Programme is a voluntary, early intervention programme that seek to promote the positive aspects of the cyber world while also looking to deter individuals from cyber criminality.

Programmes are tailored to the individual and comprise of both:

- Educational inputs, which look at raising awareness of the Computer Misuse Act 1990 and what constitutes illegal vs legal behaviour online.
- Interventions: Varying region to region they include access to online e-learning platforms as well as in person and virtual workshops with industry professionals.

The programme doesn't look to divert anyone's interest in cyber, but instead aim to engage with them, providing the support and guidance they need to develop their interest and put them on a positive path.

Knife Crime- Looks at the issues and understand the consequences around carrying a knife, know the law relating to carrying a knife and the impact of knife crime.

Violence Prevention- Looks at the Law in relation to violent behaviour and the risks and consequences of this, identify when aggressive behaviour becomes criminal, explain the legal consequences of violent behaviours and describes the role of the police in enforcing the law in relation to violence.

Exploitation- managing risk and staying safe-Gangs- know the difference between healthy & unhealthy relationships and to understand that unhealthy relationships can lead to exploitation.

Relationship Safety- To recognise and manage unwanted attention and inappropriate behaviour

On-line Hate Crime- Understand what is meant by 'on-line hate', look at the impact of online hate on people who are targeted and strategies for responding to online hate, including reporting it.

Drugs- the legal consequences of using illegal drugs, looking at the short and long term legal consequences of being found in possession of, using, selling or supplying different classes of drugs and the police's role in enforcing drugs law.

This is simple and straightforward. You need to contact the organisation or the named person on the profile sheet and they will get back to you to confirm booking/details with you as soon as they can. It is worth bearing in mind that all organisations need as much notice as possible so the more time you are able to provide prior to delivery the better.

Disclosure and Barring Service Checks

It is the school's responsibility to decide whether an external visitor should be DBS checked and to what level before being allowed onsite. These decisions need to be based on activity, frequency and contact level.

Organisations which form part of this Stay Safe Directory will have their own safeguarding policies and employee checks as part of their service and it is up to schools to ensure that the required safeguarding processes are satisfied.

The school's safeguarding policy should outline the types of checks that are undertaken for the different roles in school including those for non-school teaching staff who carry out one off activities. Anyone carrying out regulated activity relating to children will require a DBS check.

Regulated activity is explained here in more detail:

Evaluations

It is important to assess and adapt activities to ensure they are as effective as they can be and can help identify areas for improvement.

The organisations involved in delivering the sessions in this programme have been doing so for many years and the identified learning intentions help to identify what the learning outcomes of each session will be. If you require further evidence or evaluations please speak to the organisation concerned.



School Funding

The Pupil Premium is allocated to children from low income families who are eligible for free school meals, children who have been looked after continuously for more than six months and children whose parents are currently serving in the armed forces. Its purpose is to address inequality, ensuring that funding to tackle disadvantage and support emotional and social well-being reaches the pupils who need it most. Schools are free to spend the Pupil Premium allocation as they see fit, and are held accountable for how they have used the funds.

Many of the activities and sessions offered in this programme can help improve personal, social and emotional education and attitudes to learning and attendance across the school. Here are the Pupil Premium rates for eligible pupils from September 2021.

Pupils in reception to year 6	£1,345
Pupils in years 7 to 11	£955
Looked after children	£2,345
Armed Service Children Pupils in year groups reception to year 11	£310

The main focus of this <u>lesson</u> is research through group work where students uncover different sub-topics of modern slavery (trafficking, domestic work, child slavery, bonded and forced labour).
